

- I am your opportunity to renew your allegiance to Him who said, "Behold, I make all things new." I am the new year.



(Recipe requested from the charcuterie *board lunch*) MacLAREN'S COCKTAIL CHEESE COINS 1 tub MacLaren's Imperial Sharp Cold Pack Cheddar Cheese ¹/₂ cup oil 1 tsp Worcestershire Sauce $1 \frac{1}{4}$ c flour 2 tsp dry mustard 2 cups rice crispy cereal Heat oven to 325 degrees Beat cheese and oil until well blended. Add Worcestershire sauce and mustard: mix well. Add flour gradually until well mixed. Fold in cereal. Drop by teaspoonful onto greased cookie sheets. Bake 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool 3 minutes; remove to wire racks to cool. Serve with currant or gourmet red

pepper/chili jelly.

President, Karen, called the meeting to order at 12:45pm and all were welcomed and thanked for coming. Diocesan President Elaine brought greetings from the Diocesan Board and explained that this could be our last meeting together as the Diocese is realigning parishes into 4 regions.

Roll Call - Total 39 present

Shelly's mother passed recently and Shelly asked that the offering go to the Alzheimer Society in memory of her mother. The offering of \$292.00 was sent to the Alzheimer Society. Future Meetings - the ACW at St. Augustine's feels that a Eucharist should be included with future gatherings whether they are meeting format or social occasions. We will decide the where, when, and format once the alignment of regions is complete.

The meeting with everyone joining in The Grace.


Christmas Pepper Appetizers

From the Chaplain Shalom

As I pondered on what to write for this coming season of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany, I started to focus on the word, Peace. This is entirely natural given the ongoing war between Russia and Ukraine and now the conflict between Israel and Hamas. The Bible verse that came to mind was Isaiah 9:6: "For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

As I looked through the various translations, I happened across The Messenger. It translates "Prince of Peace" to "Prince of Wholeness." My mind fixated on this. I have always known that the Hebrew word we translate as "peace" is "Shalom." I have also known that Shalom is so much more than just peace. Shalom paints a picture. The picture is of the Kingdom on Earth as it is in Heaven. In other words, we are to strive on Earth to bring about a true reflection of Heaven – God's realm. We pray this every Sunday. To fully paint this picture would require more room than what I am allotted here. Here is a link to a fuller explanation:

A few years back, the parish I was serving was presented with a Peace Candle. You can read about the Peace Candle here: https://www.stirlingmethodistchurch.org.uk/news/39-the-peace-candle .

I have always felt Shalom starts with us. There is not a lot you or I can do about Shalom in terms of what is happening in the wider world. There is certainly a lot we can do in our hearts and in our immediate spheres of influence. This Advent is the perfect opportunity to do a lot of heart-searching as to areas where we don't practice Shalom, the reasons why, and actions to change it. Christmas and Epiphany are the perfect times to put any plans we make regarding Shalom into practice to develop habits that will guide us through the remaining year and beyond.

I suggest that we find a special candle that speaks to us of peace. Starting on the first Sunday of Advent and continuing each day of Advent and beyond, let us light that candle using the collect in the Peace Candle link: "Lord Jesus Christ, who brought peace by the shedding of your own blood, grant us peace in our hearts; inspire us to be peacemakers, and give us courage to face the pain of the world with hope; that peace and justice may triumph everywhere. Amen."

Each day we can reflect on what this means to us and how it calls to us. Shalom or Wholeness, Completeness will not come without action on our part. Advent is also the opportunity for us to work out a lifetime commitment to Shalom in our own lives and our own spheres.

2 MINUTE GINGERBREAD CAKE IN A MUG

INGREDIENTS

- 1–1/2 tablespoons butter 1/8 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 tablespoon milk
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger

2 tablespoon sugar 1 tablespoon molasses 1/4 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon pinch of salt & pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

In a microwave-safe mug, microwave the butter until melted, about 30 seconds. Swirl around the sides of the mug. Add to the mug the sugar, milk, vanilla, and molasses; stir until smooth. Then stir in the flour, baking powder, cinnamon, ginger, salt, and black pepper until completely combined. You will want it to resemble a simple cake batter. If it's too thick, add a bit of milk. If it's too runny, add a bit of flour. Microwave the cake for about 1 minute to 1 minute 30 seconds (90 seconds) depending on your microwave. Check to make sure it's done, top with a dusting of confectioners' sugar, ice cream, or whipped cream.

REVERSIBLE KNIT LAP BLANKET

Bernat® Softee® Chunky TwistTM (10.5 oz/300 g; 316 yds/289 m) Taupe Twist (10007) 2 balls; Size U.S. 11 (8 mm) circular knitting needle 36" [91.5 cm] long or size needed to obtain gauge. Stitch markers ABBREVIATIONS Approx = Approximately Cont = Continue(ity) K = Knit P = Purl Pat = Pattern Rem = Remain(ing) Rep = Repeat RS = Right side St(s) = Stitch(es) WS = Wrong side

MEASUREMENTS Approx 36" [91.5 cm] wide x 48" [122 cm] long. GAUGE 11 sts and 14 rows = 4" [10 cm] in stocking st.

INSTRUCTIONS Cast on 96 sts. Do not join. Working back and forth across needle in rows, proceed as follows: Knit 3 rows (garter st), noting 1st row is WS. Proceed in pat as follows (see Chart on page 2): <u>1st row</u>: (RS). K3. Place marker. (K1. Pl. K3. P4) 10 times. Place marker. K3. <u>2nd row</u>: K3. Slip marker on this row and following rows. (K4. P3. K1. P1) 10 times. Slip marker on this row and following row. K3. Markers are in position to indicate section of Blanket worked in pat rep. 3 side sts at each end are worked in garter st throughout (knit every row). <u>3rd row</u>: K3. (Pl. K1. Pl. K3. P3) 10 times. K3. <u>4th row</u>: K3. (K3. P3. K1. Pl. K1) 10 times. K3. <u>5th row</u>: K3. (P2. K1. Pl. K3. P2) 10 times. K3. <u>6th row</u>: K3. (K2. P3. K1. Pl. K2) 10 times. K3. <u>7th row</u>: K3. (P3. K1. Pl. K3. P1) 10 times. K3. <u>11th row</u>: K3. (K1. P1. K2) 10 times. K3. <u>12th row</u>: K3. (P2. K1. Pl. K4. P1) 10 times. K3. <u>13th row</u>: K3. (K2. P4. K1. BASE 1 cup flour 1/2 cup margarine 2 TBSP icing sugar Combine until crumbly. Press into 9x9 pan lined with foil and sprayed with PAM. Bake @ 350 F for 10 mins.

TOPPING

4 tsp margarine 1 cup flaked almonds (1 pkg) 1/4 cup whipping cream 1/2 cup brown sugar 1 tsp vanilla 1/4 cup corn syrup Combine in medium saucepan. Bring to a boil. Boil for 5 mins, let cool for a couple of minutes. Pour over base. Bake for an additional 15 mins @ 350 F.


ACW Holy Eucharist

Social Action

There has certainly been a lot of talk these days about the rising cost of living and the struggle that causes for so many people. "The Food Banks Canada Hunger Count report" recorded a 73% increase in food bank use across Alberta between 2019 and 2022 – the proof that making those grocery budget dollars stretch between pay periods has become harder and harder.

Food banks in all of our communities are asking for whatever help you can provide and you may be wondering how to make the most out of whatever help you can give. Here are a few tips that might help you get the most from those donations.

First, be assured that whatever help you can give, from a single can of food to a bigger gift, it is always appreciated. No donation is too small!

Second, when you are grocery shopping, if there is something you need for your pantry, chances are it will be needed by someone else receiving from the food bank. Think healthy, non-perishable food whenever possible.

Next, I know that you are very savvy shoppers! Looking for those sale prices and comparing cost savings between brands and sizes is something you do on a regular basis for your own shopping. Those same advantages apply when you are looking for what to donate so go ahead and take advantage of that if you are planning to donate anything from your grocery run.

And finally, I know you have heard the phrase "cash is king" when it comes to donations. That may sound a little crass and might need some explanation. Cash donations are needed to purchase perishable items for those food boxes. Things like milk, eggs, meat and fresh produce are important at the foodbank and are most efficiently purchased through bulk orders from cash donations. Staff can also be great shoppers and have great connections with the local retail grocery stores who help them keep watch for sales and deals on bulk buying items.

I hope these ideas have helped you a little when it comes to considering what to put into that food donation box. I know that the recipients appreciate the help given with their foodbank box.
