There is an old Anglican cliche that says, "Once an experiment, twice a tradition" The Anglican Fellowship of Prayer is trying something we haven't done before- we are inviting you to become a pilgrim. More specifically we are asking you to join us on April 5 for, "Walking the Way of Jesus from Jerusalem to your Home". This event is an online pilgrimage with Richard Sewell the dean of St. George's College Jerusalem. (Timing and Zoom details are elsewhere in this newsletter)

Our pilgrimage will be on the eve of Passiontide, the time from the Fifth Sunday of Lent to the evening of Easter Eve. Our hope is to help people enter into that time with a deeper understanding and connection to the events of Holy Week and to experience this unique time in the Christian calendar in a new and more vibrant way.

The tradition of a pilgrimage has been part of the Christian spiritual practice for centuries. There are many reasons people participate in pilgrimages- for some it is to find forgiveness, for others to enrich their understanding of God in their life and for others to seek profound answers to some of life's most difficult questions. There is no wrong reason to enter into pilgrimage. The one thing we can be sure of is there will be opportunities to experience God's grace as we journey with the holy one.

In traditional pilgrimage journeys people leave their normal surroundings to be drawn closer to God. However you choose to participate in our pilgrimage- in your home, by inviting friends in by gathering at your parish church Dean Richard will take us to holy places to walk in the footsteps of Jesus that will strengthen and renew our faith.

Dean Richard will offer two reflections on site in Jerusalem which bring the Holy City into your home as he reflects on the ways that we can walk the way of Jesus. He was resurrected in the city and, according to Luke's gospel, ascended into heaven from the Mount of Olives. These are not simply events in the life of Jesus but provide the guide for us, as Christians today about how we can live the way of Christ in our contexts. The Holy Land is living under the shadow of war and Dean Richard will ponder how this reality can speak to the Christian life, wherever you live as we approach Holy Week and Easter.

This Ash Wednesday, I invited our community to spent Lent prayerfully reflecting on the passage from Isaiah 58.6-7, asking us if this is the fast we have chosen. Isaiah was speaking to a community overwhelmed by political instability, economic uncertainty, and general anxiety... and his words speak to us today. Just as he invited the community then to be intentional about faithful acts of self-sacrifice that would benefit the community of the faithful, so too are we called to recognise the situations in our lives that need to be addressed.

How might we spend Lent recognising the injustices in our society, the oppressed in our midst, so that we might give of ourselves to improve their lives? How can we give of our abundance of time or skill or resources so that the hungry are fed, the unhoused find shelter, the naked being covered with grace and compassion?

While the popular fasts of "giving up" things like chocolate or coffee may remind us of our call to self-sacrifice, they seldom change the world for the better. So perhaps this Lent is a time to choose a different fast, where our spiritual journey is demonstrated in acts of compassion and grace, and loving the world as God loves.

May we all have a holy Lent, with whatever fast we choose.
